## GHS: Tales from the Frontline Ria Scheuren, Global Vice President – EHS and Product Stewardship Houghton International



## *Presenter biography*

## Presentation abstract

In May of 2012, OSHA officially adopted the Globally Harmonized System (GHS) which included a series of compliance deadlines for manufacturers, distributors and employers who are covered by the Hazard Communications Standard. The June 1, 2015 deadline which required manufacturers to have reclassified their hazardous chemicals in accordance with GHS-aligned requirements has come and gone. With almost a year of experience under our belt post June 1<sup>st</sup>, it's a good time to look back to assess where industry is related to GHS compliance and what we have learned from those in the front lines.

This presentation hopes to give the perspective of relatively small manufacturing companies who were faced with some unique and not so unique challenges in the implementation of GHS, including how to manage GHS when much of their hazard classification work depended on timely and accurate implementation by other organizations (suppliers). This presentation will hopefully share with you some common stories from the front line during the months leading up to and after the June 1, 2015 deadline and maybe provide some helpful insights to those of you who continue to be involved in GHS requirements moving forward.
