Presentation abstract

A group of widely used industrial substances sometimes called "forever chemicals" are making headlines in the US and around the world. This presentation will focus on what per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are and what are they used for. It will also probe: Why are PFAS getting so much attention? Where are they turning up in the environment? Who is focusing on PFAS pollution?
